have back, but I said three minutes, as chairperson. We'll get to it. And you know very well that I've given you 20 minutes. It's in the record, sir. Don't play those games in the public, it's not necessary.

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MR. COLVIN: Did you want to do any minutes, or you're going to pass?

MR. ALLEN: I'm going to do that a little bit later, because we have a problem with the minutes.

MR. COLVIN: Okay. All right. Well, I introduced myself to most of you folks. I am Bill Colvin, the BRAC Environmental Coordinator for Fort Monmouth. I sent out requests for topics. I got four topics that were requested to be presented, and they're in Item 3 of the agenda. And what's listed there are four topics, so I'm going to address two bullets, the first two bullets, and the last two bullets, Chris Grill will present that -- cover them in her presentation that follows.

So a short briefing was requested for the -- addressing the coordination between NJDEP and the Army since the board's meeting last April. In addition to the day-to-day actions we have with the

NJDEP, we and -- the NJDEP and the Army, including the Army's contractors --

MR. MAHEDY: I can't hear you. Could you use the microphone, please?

MR. COLVIN: Okay. NJDEP and the Army, including the contractors, have a monthly telephone conference call where we update each other on the status of the activities and actions that we are both undertaking.

During our call, we've been reviewing a punchlist of 54 ongoing activities including groundwater monitoring reporting, site investigations, document reviews, and other action items. The punchlist also includes 37 additional activities that have been completed.

Since the last RAB meeting, the Army and NJDEP have exchanged about 25 documents and correspondence. And attached to your agenda for the RAB members is the list of the documents, the final documents that we put in the repository since the last RAB meeting. These are work plans and final work plans and final reports. The priorities to documents, submittals and reviews change as data are generated and as new interest in the properties that post are developed. And we work together to adjust,

if possible, the current work flow that we have planned for our organizations to address changes as they arise.

On an as-needed basis, we also have discussions on specific technical, regulatory and timing issues. The discussions like the ones we had last January in Trenton help to support and expedite agreements on technical approaches, report reviews, and data evaluations.

The second requested item was an overview of the Fort Monmouth Environmental Compliance program.

MR. ALLEN: Could everybody see?
MR. COLVIN: Thank you.

The compliance program is performed to insure that current operations at the Fort are in full compliance with all applicable environmental regulations. To insure the water in our distribution system is safe to drink, we perform monthly, quarterly, semiannually — semiannual and annual sampling, analyses and reporting. The results are submitted to NJDEP Bureau of Safe Drinking Water throughout the year.

In addition, once a year we prepare a Consumer Confidence Report for the drinking water.

The report documents the quality of the water delivered to the Fort Monmouth community. Our next report will be distributed in July.

For the Clean Water Act, we conduct quarterly stormwater inspections, renew title licenses, and provide annual submittals to the state. And as part of the Clean Water Act compliance, we have a spill prevention control and countermeasure plan and we perform weekly inspections of aboveground storage tanks and transformer substations. We also inspect secondary containment areas after rain events.

Our Clean Air Act Title 5 permit requires that we maintain air emission logs on a monthly basis and conduct annual air emission inventories. Our permit also requires we submit status reports to the state every six months, and a compliance certification report annually.

For the Resource Conservation Recovery Act, we're required to perform weekly inspections of storage areas and management of waste in accordance with regulated processes.

Last week we submitted our annual Community Right-To-Know report to the emergency respondents of Oceanport and Eatontown, the Monmouth

Page 11 County Health Department, and the New Jersey State 1 2 Police. The report lists quantities and locations of materials that are reportable for the organizations, 3 the responding organizations to use in preparing 4 5 their response plans. 6 We're also managing other environmental 7 programs to insure compliance with the Toxic 8 Substances Control Act, reporting requirements for asbestos and abatement projects, and emergency 9 10 planning with the local authorities. 11 The next item on the agenda is Chris 12 Grill's presentation, that's Item 4, which will address the last two bullets of the requested topics 13 as well as other components of the Installation 14 15 Restoration Program here at Fort Monmouth. 16 Chris. 17 MS. GRILL: Thanks, Bill. 18 MR. ALLEN: Any comments with regard to 19 Mr. Colvin's --20 MR. CHARNICK: I just have --21 MR. COLVIN: Is this the time for 22 questions? 23 Well, he may have a MR. ALLEN: 24 question. 25 MR. CHARNICK: I just have -- of the

documents and reports you mentioned, which ones are public, if any?

MR. COLVIN: Well, all the final work plans and reports are public documents. And I don't know, once we submit the report to the state, if that's available to you. I really don't know.

MR. CHARNICK: Okay. Thank you.

MR. COLVIN: You're welcome.

MR. ALLEN: Thank you, sir.

I think it's yours, Chris.

MS. GRILL: Thank you.

Today's presentation is going to be the status overview of the Remedial Investigation/
Feasibility Study Decision documents for Fort
Monmouth. Can you go to the next slide?

Agenda items are going to include: The status overview of the nine landfills; the nine non-landfills; and the environmental conditions of property -- or ECP parcels -- including the parcels associated with the unregulated heating oil tanks, then followed by questions. Next slide.

The landfill locations on the Main Post include: Eight landfills as shown on the attached figure.

The landfill locations on the Charles

Wood Area -- or the CWA -- consists of one landfill as shown on the attached figure.

The status of the landfills include: Seven RI/FS reports that have been submitted to the state -- to the NJDEP -- including -2, -3, MO-4, MO-5, M-12, M-14, and M-18.

One report has been approved by the DEP, and that is MO-4.

Two RI/FS reports consisting of M0-8 and M-25 are currently under review by the Army prior to submittal to the NJDEP.

And the Army has received a No Further Action for groundwater from the DEP for five sites, and they consist of MO-3, MO-4, M-12, M-14 and M-25.

Recently a Landfill Boundary Refinement and Methane Gas Survey Investigation was conducted.

Over 200 test pits were advanced in August of 2015 just to refine the boundary of each landfill prior to the construction of the vegetated soil cap or functional equivalent.

Methane gas samples were conducted to monitor the potential presence and concentration of the landfill gases.

Overall the landfill boundaries did not change significantly.

Methane gas was not detected along the perimeter of the landfills demonstrating that the gas is not migrating off site, and these results were documented in a report that's been submitted to the DEP.

Future landfill documents include the following: Conceptual Design Report for the nine landfills, and that will consist of the conceptual design for the construction of the vegetated soil cap or functional equivalent for each landfill, and this requires NJDEP acceptance of this report.

A proposed plan which identifies the preferred remedy and explains the rational for the remedy and requires a 30-day public comment period and also requires NJDEP acceptance.

Decision documents provides a consolidated summary of the site conditions, the selected remedy and reason for the selection of the remedy, and this also requires NJDEP acceptance.

Remedial Action Work Plan. This document describes the proposed construction of the vegetated soil cap, the functional equivalent -- or functional equivalent, and the components of this are going to include: Summary of the findings/recommendations in the RI/FS report;

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detailed description of the remedy; the list of permits that are required including -- the following plans will consist of air monitoring, health and safety, soil reuse, quality assurance, evaluation of the effectiveness of the remedy and site restoration. It's also going to include performance specification and drawings as well as a construction schedule, and this also requires acceptance from the DEP.

will be the Remedial Action Completion Report, and this is going to document the construction of the vegetated soil cap or functional equivalent, and it includes a demonstration that the remedial action objectives have been met; the source, type, quantities and location of the fill; as-built drawings; operations, maintenance and monitoring plan; and copy of a filed deed notice, which includes institutional controls, and this also requires acceptance of the NJDEP.

The non-landfill locations on the Main Post include eight sites that are shown on this attached figure.

The non-landfill locations on the $\text{CWA}_{\,\scriptscriptstyle (}$ consist of one site as shown on the figure.

The status of the non-landfill sites

include: There are five sites that require additional -- there are four sites that require additional investigation, and they are M-22, which is on the CWA; M-53, M-59, and M-68, which are on the Main Post.

Collection of additional soil and groundwater sampling was collected in December -- was collected in October and December of 2015.

The RI/FS report for M-22 will be submitted to the Army for review by March of 2016 prior to submittal to the NJDEP.

The report for -53 and -59 are currently under development.

And additional data collection is necessary for -68 to determine the extent of VOC impacts to the soil and groundwater.

There are five sites that don't require further investigation, and they include -54, -55, -56, -61, and -66.

The report for -54 has been submitted to . the DEP.

The Army has received an NFA for groundwater from the NJDEP for three sites, and they include -54, -55, and -61, and these are all located on the Main Post.

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Reports for -55, -56, -61 and -66 are under development and will be submitted to the Army prior to the NJDEP.

Future non-landfill documents include:
Submittal of a supplemental work plan for the
collection of additional data for -68, which is on
the Main Post; submittal of the reports to the DEP as
well as preparation and submittal of the proposed
plan and decision documents.

ECP parcel locations on the Main Post are shown on this figure. And this figure shows about -- shows 19 parcels.

And the ECP parcel locations on the CWA are shown on this figure.

So the status of the ECP parcels include: The NJDEP has approved two ECP work plans for the collection of additional soil and groundwater data. The data collection is scheduled to begin at the end of the month, which is March 28th.

Sampling will be conducted at the following Parcels: -28 and -34, which are included on the CWA; and Parcels -38, -49, -50, -51, -52, -69, -80, and -83, and they are located on the Main Post.

Soil and groundwater sampling has been performed at Parcels -57 and -97 in October through

1 December of 2015.

The data indicates that additional sampling is necessary for Parcel -57 due to impacted soils for PCBs. An interim removal action for PCB impacted soil was completed at Parcel -97, and further delineation of the PCBs is required based on sampling results.

The status of the No Further Action request submitted by the Army for the following parcels include: Parcel -28: NJDEP approved a No Further Action for three leach fields and 16 UHOTs and requires additional groundwater sampling at the former gas station. Parcel -28 is on the CWA.

Parcel -39 -- the rest of the parcels that I'll be talking about will be on the Main Post. Parcel -39: The DEP approved the No Further Action request.

Parcels -49 and -50: DEP agreed with an NFA for 24 of the UHOTs.

Parcel -51: DEP is currently reviewing the Army's request for a No Further Action on 80 of the UHOTs.

Parcel -53: NJDEP approved a No Further Action for 16 of the UHOTs.

Parcels -55 and -56 -- 56 is also known

as the 800 area: -- DEP approved a No Further Action request for 16 out of the 25 UHOTs, and nine of the tanks require additional groundwater sampling.

Parcel -68: DEP approved a No Further Action request for 13 of the 14 UHOTs, and one tank requires additional groundwater sampling.

For Parcel -74: DEP approved the NFA request for 11 of the UHOTs.

Parcel -76: DEP approved the No Further Action request for 17 of the 19 UHOTs, and requires additional sampling for two of the tanks.

Parcel -77: DEP approved the NFA request for the two UHOTs.

Parcel -79: DEP approved the NFA request for 36 out of the 50 UHOTs, and requires additional soil and groundwater sampling at 14 of the UHOTs and one above-ground tank farm.

Parcel -83: DEP approved the NFA request for the 35 UHOTs.

And future parcel documents are going to consist of submittals of the supplemental work plan for the collection of additional data at Parcels -57 and -97; submittal of responses to NJDEP comments and collection of additional soil and groundwater data for select UHOTs; and finally, the preparation and

Page 20 submittal of the parcel reports describing the field 1 2 sampling results and any recommendations. And lastly, if there are any questions. 3 4 MR. ALLEN: Questions from the board? 5 MS. GRILL: Yes. 6 MR. GRUSKOS: I just have one. 7 MR. ALLEN: Give your name, if you 8 could, please. 9 MR. GRUSKOS: One of the things that 10 Wanda had mentioned --11 MR. ALLEN: Could you give your name, 12 sir? 13 MR. GRUSKOS: Oh. It's Rich Gruskos. 14 Sorry. 15 MR. ALLEN: Thank you. For the record 16 that is. 17 MR. GRUSKOS: One of the things that 18 Wanda had mentioned was that she was reexamining for 19 the BRAC all the tanks that had been previously 20 removed, right? Are these ones that have been 21 removed some time in the past, or are these suspected underground heating oil tanks that are still believed 22 23 to be there? 24 MS. GRILL: These tanks are -- so these tanks are tanks that have been either -- have been 25

removed and the Army is documenting the removal conditions, submitting this information to the DEP, and requested a No Further Action.

MR. GRUSKOS: Okay. So these are all ones that were done, let's say, during the time that RAB was running -- involved --

MS. GRILL: Correct.

MR. GRUSKOS: -- right?

It's not something where these are previously unknown tanks, these are all ones that have been systematically removed.

MS. GRILL: Correct.

MR. GRUSKOS: Thank you.

MR. ALLEN: Thank you, sir.

Anyone else on the board?

MR. BARRICELLI: Frank Barricelli.

On the landfill capping. I see a lot of coordination is going to be -- on the approval plans goes back and forth to the NJDEP. How about the towns? The three towns where Fort Monmouth exists?

If you recall, way back when we were still meeting on the other side of the Post, residents of Shrewsbury showed up because there was riprap being installed at 5:30 in the morning, and they didn't know anything about it, and neither did

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we. And if you're going to do this soil capping, that's going to require extensive trees to be removed, lots of heavy equipment coming in, putting in two feet of cap, and then reseeding. What kind of coordination approvals will be done with the town so they know what's going on and they don't get surprised?

MR. ALLEN: Good question.

MR. BARRICELLI: Anybody?

MR. ALLEN: Anybody wish to respond?

MR. MOORE: Hello, sir. My name is Jim Moore. I'm with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, New York District, and I support Fort Monmouth in all the work in the redevelopment associated with the Fort, to include the landfills, the covers, and the caps.

It is our plan to work with the towns to provide public notification about the type of work that will get done, make public notification about work hours and when work hours will be done, rough schedules about which landfills will be done in which sequence and which time, and also we're coordinating those activities with the Fort Monmouth Economic Reuse Authority. So they will be given proper notification.

We also envision that a community relations outreach effort will be required within a certain proximity of where all that work will be involved. So if there is a resident nearby, or within a certain distance, they will get a paper fax sheet indicating an activity is being performed, and a contact person to call should they have questions. Does that answer your question, sir?

MR. BARRICELLI: Okay. Yeah, pretty well. But I know we have plans prepared, and then plans for plans for plans. And this procedure, when it was reached, was quite involved.

MR. MOORE: Yes.

MR. BARRICELLI: Do we have any forecast of time frame? I mean, gross terms. Are we looking at one year, two years, three years. Because I know you have to get money, you have to get the claims approved. Do we have any forecast?

MR. MOORE: I can give you rough forecasts. I cannot comment about how long things take to review or comment on it, but I can give you in a -- in a rough timeline when things will happen. Right now, it's 2016. I envision within a two-year time period, we will have received comments from the department on our proposed action, we will have had

an opportunity to go out to the public and provide the public an opportunity to comment as required by law under the proposed plan phase of the process.

After that proposed plan phase of the process, we will formalize everything in a Record of Decision, and we will work with the department on getting approved. And then according to the process, after that is approved, then we can go on to construction.

So the construction of the landfills will happen roughly beginning sometime in 2018 and be completed in 2019.

MR. BARRICELLI: Okay. Thank you.

MR. MOORE: One point I will let you know is Chris made a comment about functional equivalent as far as the landfills. I wanted to make sure that everyone was aware that there are certain cases that these landfills can be used and be incorporated as part of what the redevelopment of the Fort will be.

So just because there's going to be a two foot cap, that could very easily be a two foot cap with a parking lot or a basketball court over the top of it. It could be whatever supports redevelopment activities and best enhances the value

1 of the Fort or the communities.

MR. ALLEN: What is the two foot made of? riprap? Soil?

MR. MOORE: It's made of certified clean fill that we have to provide to the state documentation of clean fill. And then -- and then we do a certain amount of testing per volume of material to prove it's certified clean.

MR. ALLEN: And final inspection is by?

MR. MOORE: Final inspection will be

done by the Corps of Engineers, and also we'll give

the DEP Landfill Department Solid Waste folks an

opportunity to do a walk and comment on. And

obviously, we will warranty that project -- product

for a certain amount of time.

MR. ALLEN: Assume it's a municipality, because of the land where it exists, where does that warranty go? Just for the record.

MR. MOORE: The warranty would be something that the Corps of Engineers would put on the product for a certain period of time. Also, you have to know that there are certain -- going to be certain operational plans such as erosion control plans, operations and maintenance plans to make sure that the cap serves its intended purpose. And if

there's any issues that come up associated with the cap such as erosion, they can be impaired, and the entirety of the cap can be maintained.

MR. ALLEN: In the future, when the property changes its ownership, they would have that warranty in hand if they should have to fall back on it?

MR. MOORE: Potentially.

MR. ALLEN: Okay. Yeah. Good. But, again, I'm putting that in the record so the people who read these in the future will have an idea of what they're getting into when they buy that land that's now --

MR. MOORE: Yes. And they'll also get copies of all the operations and maintenance plans that says we're going to have to do periodic inspections probably every year or two years of the landfills to make sure that the integrity of the cap is maintained, and if there's any issues that need to be addressed, they can be addressed. That could be the addition of a little bit of riprap, it could be the addition of some additional clean fill in certain areas; it all depends on physical inspections. Those will be documented in reports and provided to the department.

MR. ALLEN: Thank you. Well done.

Any other questions for Chris?

MS. GRILL: Thanks Jim.

MR. GRUSKOS: Just one.

MR. ALLEN: Go right ahead, sir.

MR. GRUSKOS: Rich Gruskos again.

As far as, like, the need for ongoing sampling, can you just address that a little bit?

Like assuming that this property changes hands, who's going to be responsible for any deed restriction samplings and so on moving forward?

MS. GRILL: That might be an answer for Jim again.

MR. MOORE: Jim Moore, Army Corps of Engineers, New York District.

The need for ongoing sampling: The Army is obligated to take actions at Fort Monmouth to determine the nature and extent of contamination in certain locations; there are 18 of them, and specific parcels where we have identified potential for contamination that needs to be addressed, evaluated, and then those plans need to be given to the state to review and comment on, and that's an ongoing process and we have a long laundry list of sites to do.

Mr. Colvin mentioned at the beginning of

the presentation about a list that we meet with Linda Range on once a month and coordinate on.

Now, if an interested party wants to go out and purchase a portion of that site and that site has an encumbrance on it, or an environmental issue, the expectation is there's going to be either be an action or a deed notice that will document what type of environmental condition exists at that site at the time.

MR. ALLEN: If I may, Jim Allen.

I served as mayor in two separate distinct municipalities, and I think that will eventually fall to the zoning boards and the boards that protect the land. That's what I'm looking at. That's what I've had to deal with with Picatinny and things like that. Thank you, sir.

Yes, Brian.

MR. CHARNICK: Brian Charnick with

Eatontown.

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It's been a long time since our last

meeting --

MR. ALLEN: Yes.

MR. CHARNICK: -- and I noticed here that there seem to be additional data collection requirements, apparently new volatile organic

compound issues. Can -- can you summarize, are any of these sort of new things that happened since our last meeting, or just as a result of ongoing monitoring?

For instance, it looks like site -68 on the Main Post where the dry cleaner was, I think there was a plume moving towards the McAfee Center, and it says "additional data collections required to determine the extent of VOC activity." Is -- is that something new that happened, or has anything changed really since our last meeting? Any new sites? Any new contamination? Any plans that went ary, or anything like that?

MS. GRILL: No. Just recently, we completed the field investigation in October/December of 2015. And there was some back and forth with the state regarding some of our work plans and we had to clarify some of the comments and we finally got our work plans approved.

What this is is we went out and we collected additional data to fill in some of the data gaps. And what we found out is that, we need to go back out and collect some more data to verify the extent of the plume, to collect additional groundwater samples associated with M-68.

And the majority of the work has previously been done at Fort Monmouth, and right now the work that we'll be doing on the other sites like -22, -53, -68, we're collecting additional data just to fill in the data gaps.

MR. CHARNICK: Okay.

MR. ALLEN: Thank you.

MR. CHARNICK: Thank you very much.

Good answer.

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MR. ALLEN: Anything else, Chris?

I don't want the same thing to happen here, so I think it's really important to know who now has access to the website. Because even over the last month, there was some things that were taken down from it, so I'd like to know who actually now is in charge of the website, and who was in charge of the website when this happened.

As I said, it's a very serious charge; it's a felony. And then -- because it destroys the evidence of any poisoning here on -- on the base, and even we're drinking bottled water here. Why is that? Because a lot of the piping is still cracked and has had contamination. So those are very important things to know for the public.

Right now, as I said, the website is not working. You click on the things, it doesn't come up. It only goes up to 2008, and I would challenge Mr. Colvin to -- when he said nothing was lost, because that's not what Wanda said when she was

leaving. She said, Well, we're gonna do our best.

Next: As far as caretaking, I see it more as not caring than caretaking, because I don't agree with what was presented as far as -- I don't think the Army has done all that they can. And if we look around the country and around the world, a lot of times they leave a lot of contamination behind.

I know that there's a lot of pressure for the DEP to go along and pass things. I'm very concerned specifically about a few things. One is that when the Myer's building comes down, there's gonna be a huge amount of contaminated dust. I don't want what happened with Christie Whitman, who was the head of the EPA when she approved and said everything was fine after 911 and the first responders died because of all the dust in their lungs.

We have Trinity School of girls that is less than a quarter mile from the Myer's Center. How are you gonna stop any dust from coming that way? How are you gonna stop the dust to come into where there is also a Monmouth County --

MR. CHARNICK: Recreation.

MR. MAHEDY: Yes, center as well. I'm very concerned for their safety, because this dust is very hard to stop. And you can't even always see

1.4

it, but it will lodge into the lungs. So I'm very concerned about that.

I'm concerned about the gas station, which Monmouth County just said they're gonna buy, but they said it's not totally cleaned up. But it's going towards the water, towards the -- the -- and they said the county's going to build a walkway over that for a nature walk. But that's contaminated water. So I'm very concerned about that. I asked Lillian Berry, she said, The county doesn't buy contaminated property. Well, that is contaminated property, because that's what -- when I was on the environmental committee, we talked about it a lot. So I'm very concerned about that as well. And how are we gonna protect the children from that?

And when I was on the environmental committee, they said, too, they can use that water outside for their landscaping, but not to drink it. I was very clear about that.

In the library where I was told by Wanda to go get the information: I went to the library, and it doesn't have the information that was on the website. So we're told to go to the library that has backup; it doesn't have it. It isn't there. And I've been there many times over -- over the years.

I'm also concerned about the police who patrol the -- all the grounds here. They've never been told where the contaminated sites are. And if they get out of their car and they're walking around, they go home and bring it to their children, I'm concerned about that. And I've said it to the State Police, and they were very upset that their barracks were never tested even after there was flooding and it went all around in their barracks and it brought things right over the dumps onto that. And the RAB or FMERA never tested it. Never tested the water, never tested the air, never tested the soil around the barracks and that's wrong, because I think we should treat them better especially if they have small children.

As far as the No Further Action: I think the DEP is under a lot of pressure to pass

things, and if you just look up in North Jersey what's happened with the site up there up by Ramapo, there's a lot of things that had been clearly swept under the rug and there's a lot of contaminated water there. And we have to stop saying the word "landfill," because there's no liners in the dumps. So it's clear that they're all dumps, and we should use that terminology.

And I would disagree with John as far as that they have done their best as far as environmental cleanup on this base. They're all fine people, but I think everybody's under a tremendous amount of pressure to -- to cover things up.

And I'm very concerned about the Myer's Center, too, because you should speak to Joe, who was on this committee at one point, and he said there's a tremendous amount of contamination right in the middle of the Myer's Center. That that will never be cleaned up.

And as far as FMERA, they're always taking about carve-outs. Carve-outs where there's a contaminated site, but it's gonna be carved out, and I disagree with that because just because it's carved out doesn't mean that the contamination is going to stop there. So my main concern is the health and

welfare of the people who will be walking on these grounds.

And I've said this in the past, it's a personal issue because a friend of mine died who -there was contamination from a base and there was a development that was put up right by it, and she had three children under the age of five. So I know that things are not always cleaned up well, I know there's a lot of pressure to, you know, push things through, but we have to think about it.

And, you know, just as examples as I was saying about the --

MR. ALLEN: You have one minute, sir.

MR. MAHEDY: All right. -- the girls who are there from Trinity high, and then the children who will be, you know, at that site where the gas station is, these are just, you know, the beginning. But I hope that this group here -- again, I know that there's pressure to just say, Well, let's go on. But we have to start by getting the website back up, we have to do a very thorough investigation about what happened, who was in charge, the chain of command.

MR. GRUSKOS: If I could, just to answer your question. I think the intended purchaser for the gas station there on Hope Road is actually going to be the county, and they were going to be using that as a staging area for county vehicles. So part of the issues on what sort of a level to apply depends on that master plan that was developed for the Fort and was that going to be designated a residential area or not. So a lot of these things — that type of guidance is what's driving it.

In a related matter -- and this may get back to one of the things that Tom asked. In general, I would say FMERA does not want to take ownership of contaminated property that's inconsistent with the intended use of that in the master plan. So when they do carve-outs, that's basically they don't want to excuse the Army from having to get to the point where there's no further action that's been approved by the DEP before taking ownership of that property.

And, you know, getting to the Myer's Center question, you know, my impression so far has been that the work plans that have to be developed are something, then, that that too has to go through the DEP during the process. So I cannot tell you

what the -- what appropriate means, but that does seem to be the methodology. So if they're going to, you know, wash while -- you know, try to keep the dust down --

MS. RANGE: Yeah, they'll be dust depression.

MR. GRUSKOS: You know, so that's like a typical topic. And FMERA has its own environmental advisory committee and a member of the DEP that sits on the board that's basically charged with a lot of those responsibilities. And --

MR. CHARNICK: Okay.

MR. GRUSKOS: So, you know, I feel like Tom raised a whole bunch of good points, so I'm just going to keep basically keep those as a bullet list myself, just because, you know, I feel a lot of those things have merit. And it's just that there's such a wide range of topics, Tom, that it's hard to, you know, address them all.

So, you know, they use the term in DEP "historic landfills" for something that's not up to design level rather than calling it a dump. That's just, like, DEP's, you know, in-house terminology, I would say. And it's just -- there's a lot of issues in there.

And then on some of the ones, like, you know, your concerns over safety and of the resulting both in the process and so on and the website, you know, I basically, you know, asked Bill when he's talking to Tim Meyer, whatever, just -- it would be worth just giving a little report on that at the next meeting on what was found, you know, and so on.

I know my own company website has been hacked. All the organizational websites that I participate in, they've all been hacked at one point or another just for no good reason. And the main thing is that the restoration process following a site going down is affective so there's no loss of information, you know.

MR. COLVIN: Yes. And I'll follow up with Tom's question.

MR. GRUSKOS: I just think that's a good point to raise, you know, in light of, you know --

MR. CHARNICK: I think what Tom --

MR. GRUSKOS: -- any suspicions.
